The prestigious John Nicholls Prize will also be awarded for the best new research.

Thursday examines prevention of IBD-related cancer, strategies to halt Crohn's disease progression, post-colonoscopy

cancers, and advances in endoscopy at the surgical frontier.

On **Friday**, we turn to minimalist approaches in early rectal cancer, the St Mark's Debate on neoadjuvant treatment versus immediate surgery for non-mesorectal fascia—involving colorectal cancer, neuromotility conditions under the principle *primum non nocere*, and our Consultant Corner in IBD. A special Sponsor Symposium will present the latest developments in the field, and on Wednesday and Thursday we will host breakfast and lunchtime Round Table Workshops in small groups with leading experts; early booking is essential as places are limited.

This Congress is accredited for 15 CPD points by the Association of Coloproctology of Great Britain & Ireland (ACPGBI) and for 19 CPD credits by the Federation of the Royal College of Physicians (RCP).
